The Federation operates predominantly in one business and geographical segment, being a representative body of civil construction contractors in New South Wales, providing professional services, information and advice including industrial relations advice, dspute resolution, training (business, occupational health and safety), changes to acts and legislation, changes to award rates of and work practices to members of the Federation throughout New South Wales.

No significant change in the nature of these activities occurred during the year.

No significant changes in the state of affairs of the Federation occurred during the financial year.

Operating Results

The deficit of the Federation for the fnancial year after providing for income tax amounted to \$29,061 (2003: \$10,645 deficit).

OPERATING REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2004

Review of Operations

The small deficit is a satisfactory outcome for a not for profit organisation given this includes some \$50,000 depreciation, write off of bad or doubtful debtors, and settlement of an outstanding legal claim going back to the year 2000 of \$24,800.

Overall there was a small increase in turnover of \$65,000 and an increase in cash at hand of \$16,000 which confirms a year of consolidation of the previous years activities.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2004

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the requirements of the Workplace Relations Act 1996.

The financial report covers Civil Contractors Federation (NSW Branch) as an individual entity. Civil Contractors Federation (NSW Branch) is a Federation Incorporated in NSW under the Workplace Relations Act 1996.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following specific accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of the financial report:

a. Income Tax

The Federation is registered under the Workplace Relations Act, 1996 and, is considered to be exempt from income tax including capital gains tax, by virtue of the provision of s.50-15 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

b. Cash Assets

For the purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, cash includes cash on hand and at call deposits with banks or financial institutions, investments in money market instruments maturing within less than three months and net of bank overdrafts.

c. Plant and Equipment

Each class of plant and equipment are carried at cost or fair value, less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are recorded at cost.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by the Committee of Management to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount of those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected cash flows which will be received from the assets employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to present value in determining recoverable amounts.

Depreciation

The depreciable amounts of plant and equipment are depreciated using the diminishing value method at rates based on their estimated useful lives commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are:-

Office, furniture and equipment	15-40%
Leasehold improvements	10%
Motor Vehicles - leased	22.5%

NOTE 1 - STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - Continued

d. investments

Non-current investments are measured on the cost basis. The carrying amount of investments is reviewed annually by the Committee of Management to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount of these investments. The recoverable amount is assessed from the quoted market value for shares in listed companies or the underlying net assets for other non-listed corporations. The expected net cash flows from investments have not been discounted to their present value in determining the recoverable amounts.

e. Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the Federation's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee benefits expected to be settled within one year together with benefits arising from wages and salaries, annual and long service leave which will be settled after one year, have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled plus related on-costs.

Contributions are made by the Federation to employee superannuation funds and are charged as expenses when incurred.

f. Leases

Leases of fixed assets, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset, but not the legal ownership, are transferred to the Federation are classified as finance leases. Finance leases are capitalised, recording an asset and a liability equal to the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values. Leased assets are depreciated on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives where it is likely that the Federation will obtain ownership of the asset or over the term of the lease. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for the period.

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the periods in which they are incurred.

Lease incentives received under operating leases are recognised as a liability. Lease payments received reduce the liability.

g. Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of expense.

Receivables and payables in the Statement of Financial Position are shown inclusive of GST. The net amount of tax recoverable from, or payable to the Australian Taxation Office is included within other assets or other liabilities.

Cash flows are included in the Statement of Cash Flows on a gross basis. The tax component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the Australian Taxation Office is classified as operating cash flows.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2004

NOTE 1 - STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - Continued

h. Revenue

Revenue for membership subscriptions is recognised proportionately over the period to which it relates.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised in proportion to the stage of completion of the contract and the entitlement to the Federation.

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

i. Operating Segment

The Federation is incorporated under the Workplace Relations Act 1996 and domiciled in Australia.

The Federation operates predominantly in one business and geographical segment, being a representative body of civil engineering contractors in New South Wales, providing professional services, information and advice including industrial relations advice, dispute resolution, training (business, occupational health and safety), changes to acts and legislation, changes to award rates of and work practices to members of the Federation throughout New South Wales.

j. Impact of Adopting International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS)

The Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB) is adopting Australian equivalents to International Finance Representation Standards (AIFRS) for application to reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2005. The adoption of AIFRS will be first reflected in the Federations financial statements for the year ending 30 June 2006. Finance Committee Management, along with its auditors are assessing and overseeing the transition process and reporting periodically to the Committee of Management.

The Federation is in the process of analysing the full impact of AIFRS. The actual impacts will depend on the particular circumstances and conditions prevailing at any time of application of AIFRS. For these reasons it is not yet possible to fully quantify the impact of the transition to AIFRS on the Federation.

k. Comparatives

Where necessary to facilitate comparison, comparative figures have been adjusted in some instances to comply with the current year's disclosure.

I acknowledge receipt of the financial report of the Civil Contractors Federation - New South Wales Branch for the year ended 30 June 2004. The documents were lodged in the Industrial Registry on 10 January 2005. I also refer to telephone conversations with Mr Martin Wright of your office on 7 February 2005 and 22 March 2005.

Financial reporting timelines

Financial reports should be prepared, audited, supplied to members, presented to a meeting and lodged in the Industrial Registry within certain timescale requirements. I have enclosed a fact sheet produced by the Registry "Financial Reporting Process and Time Limits" for your assistance and guidance. It is apparent from the Executive Director's certificate and the date of other documents that the Branch cannot have complied with the requirements of sections 265, 266 or 268 of Schedule 1B of the Workplace Relations Act 1996 (the RAO Schedule). Before the financial documents can be filed the Branch will need to circulate the relevant documents to members at least 21 days before the documents are submitted for approval at a General Meeting of Members. Subsequently a copy of those documents should be lodged in the Registry within 14 days of being presented to the relevant meeting.

Loan, Grant, Donation exceeding \$1000

I note in "Note 5: Receivables" there are references to various loans exceeding \$1,000. Section 237 of Schedule 1B requires that an organisation or branch shall, as soon as practicable after the end of the financial year, lodge with the Registrar a statement showing the relevant particulars in relation to each loan, grant or donation of an amount exceeding \$1,000 made by the organisation or branch during the financial year. If any single loan, grant or donation exceeds \$1,000 then the branch is required to lodge the relevant particulars set out in subsection 237(6).

Future Reports

Notwithstanding the above, I advise I have examined the financial documents and make the following comment to assist you in the preparation of future financial reports. No further action is required in relation to the documents already submitted.

Operating report

(a) Subsection 254(2)(a) of Schedule 1B provides the report should contain "a review of the reporting unit's principal activities", amongst other things. I think this requirement demands more than a statement of the role of the reporting unit. I suggest, as a minimum, the report should state, in

broad terms at least, the principal activities the organisation engaged in during the year in representing the industrial interests of its members.

- (b) Subsection 254(2)(a) provides that the operating report must "give *details* of the right of members to resign from the reporting unit" (my emphasis). The branch may wish to consider reproducing the whole of the relevant rule in the operating report. That would clearly satisfy the requirements of subsection 254(2)(a).
- (c) The obligation in Section 254(2)(d) refers to "officers *or members* of a registered organisation" (my emphasis). I note the Operating Report only refers to there being "no officers" who fall into the relevant category.

Statement by the Committee

The Statement need only be signed by a designated officer (see point 18(c) of "Determination of reporting guidelines for the purposes of section 253 of RAO Schedule").

The Auditor's Report

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The opinion expressed by the auditor in their report has been drafted in terms of the previous requirements of the Act. Section 257(5) of the RAO Schedule now sets out the matters on which an auditor is required to state an opinion. An example of acceptable wording would be as follows:

"In our opinion the general purpose financial report presents fairly in accordance with applicable Australian Accounting Standards and other mandatory professional reporting requirements in Australia and the requirements of the RAO Schedule"

It is not clear from the Report whether or not the Auditor is an approved auditor. In this regard I draw your attention to the definition of approved auditor in regulation 4 of the RAO Regulations. In all likelihood the Auditor is such a person however, it is our preference that this is made explicit in the Report.

I recommend you draw these comment to the attention of your Auditor.

Financial Return - year ending 30 June 2004

This letter is intended to remind you of your obligations to provide members with copies of your reporting unit's financial reports for year ended 30 June 2004 and to lodge the reports in the Industrial Registry by no later than Friday 14 January 2005.

Over the past 18 months you would have received from us information about the major changes made by Schedule 1B of the *Workplace Relations Act 1996* ('RAO' ²⁰).

Financial Reports

Your reporting unit must prepare or have prepared the following three reports as soon as practicable after its financial year:

- 1. A General Purpose Financial Report (GPFR);
- 2. An Operating Report; and
- 3. An Auditor's Report.

Informing Your Members

Your reporting unit must provide free of charge to the general membership, copies of the abovementioned reports (the "full report"). Under certain circumstances, your reporting unit can provide a more limited concise report.

The report must be provided within 5 or 6 months from the end of the financial year, depending on the internal arrangements of the reporting unit for the presentation of its financial reports.

A reporting unit may make application to a Registrar to extend the period within which copies of the full report or concise report are to be provided to members by no more than one month.

The Second Meeting - if it is a General Meeting of Members

After providing the full report to members it must be presented to a general meeting of members (the *second meeting*). This meeting must be held within 6 months of the end of the financial year. You may make application to a Registrar to extend this time limit by no more than one month so that the time limit for providing to members copies of the full report or concise report may in turn be extended.

²⁰ Registration and Accountability of Organisations Schedule (RAO) (Schedule 1B to the Workplace Relations Act 1996)

Your reporting unit must always allow a minimum of 21 days for members to receive the full report before presenting it to a general meeting of members (s265(5)). The purpose of the interval and the second meeting is to enable the members to have time to consider the report and, if they wish, to attend the second meeting to discuss it.

If the rules of the organisation permit a general meeting to be a series of meetings held at different locations, the full report may be presented to such a series of meetings. In this case the 'date' of the general meeting is taken to be the date of the last meeting in the series (see s266(2)).

The Second Meeting - if it is a Committee of Management Meeting

If your rules contain a provision that allows up to 5% of members to demand a general meeting to be held to consider the full report (see s266(3)), it is permissible to present the full report directly to a Committee of Management meeting. This meeting must be held within 6 months of the end of the financial year.

There is no provision for extending the time-limit for presenting the full report to a committee of management meeting.

Lodge full report within 14 days of meeting

You must lodge a copy of the full report and any concise report in the Industrial Registry within 14 days of the second meeting.

Your reporting unit's financial reports should, therefore, be lodged by no later than Friday 14 January 2005.
