Re: – Shop, Distributive and Allied Employees Association, Newcastle and Northern Branch - financial report for year ending 30 June 2019 (FR2019/149)

I refer to the financial report of the Shop, Distributive and Allied Employees Association, Newcastle and Northern Branch (**the Branch**). The documents were lodged with the Registered Organisations Commission (**ROC**) on 26 September 2019.

The financial report has been filed. The financial report was filed based on a primary review. This involved confirming that the financial reporting timelines required under s.253, s.265, s.266 and s.268 of the *Fair Work (Registered Organisations) Act 2009* (RO Act) have been satisfied, all documents required under s.268 of the RO Act were lodged and that various disclosure requirements under the Australian Accounting Standards, RO Act and reporting guidelines have been complied with. A primary review does not examine all disclosure requirements. Please note that the financial report for the year ending 30 June 2020 may be subject to an advanced compliance review.

You are not required to take any further action in respect of the report lodged. However, further to our discussion today, I make the following comments to assist you when preparing the next report.

Disclosure of capitation fees or other expense to another reporting unit, affiliation fees

Reporting guideline (**RG**) 14(b) requires disclosure in relation to capitation fees (however described) or to any other expense to another reporting unit. RG 14(c) requires disclosure in relation to fees paid in respect of affiliation to any political party, any federation, congress, council or group of organisations, or any international body having an interest in industrial matters. RG 21 requires a nil activity disclosure for any category that did not occur in the reporting period.

Based on our discussion today, if the Branch distinguishes between capitation fees and its affiliation fees to National Office (incl. the International Fund), and does not pay affiliation fees to any external entity, all other things being equal, with appropriate re-numbering, next year's report should disclose these items as follows:

"The reporting unit discloses balances for the following items of expense for the current reporting year (prior reporting year stated in brackets if applicable):

a) Affiliation fees (to other reporting unit) –

i. Shop, Distributive & Allied Employees' Association (National Office) – \$XXX.XX (2019: \$YYY.YY)

ii. Shop; Distributive & Allied Employees' Association (International Fund) – \$XXX.XX (2019: \$YYY.YY)

- b) Capitation fees to another reporting unit of the organisation;
- c) Fees and periodic subscriptions paid in respect of its affiliation to any political party, any federation, congress, council or group of organisations, or any international body having an interest in industrial matter
- d) (etc)

This means appropriate nil activity disclosures will be made in respect of capitation fees [RG14(b)] and external affiliation fees [RG14(c)], and appropriate disclosure will be made in respect of 'any other expense to another reporting unit' [RG14(b)], (i.e. the amounts for affiliation fees to National Office.)

Notes to the Cash Flow Statement

Reporting guideline 18 states:

Where another reporting unit and/or controlled entity of the organisation is the source of a cash inflow or the application of a cash outflow, the following details of such cash flow should be separately disclosed either in the cash flow statement or in the notes to the financial statements:

- i. the name of the other reporting unit and/or controlled entity concerned; and
- ii. the amount paid to/received from each.

This is in addition to the requirement to disclose revenue or expense to/from another reporting unit [reporting guideline 13(b) and 14(b)].

Note 16(c) states that cash flows with related parties are disclosed at note 10 and Note 16(d) states that there were no cash flows with other reporting units. As we discussed, affiliation fees to National Office (incl. the International Fund) are, according to RG14(b), an 'expense to another reporting unit'. This means that the cash outflow generated would be a cash flow 'to another reporting unit.'

If the same transaction(s) continue to apply, I suggest next year's report should amend its statement at Note 16(d) as follows:

d) Cash inflows/outflows with other reporting units

Cash flow to SDAEA National Office \$XXX.XX Cash flow from other reporting units \$0

Unless there are other cash flows, to/from other reporting units, the above would address RG 18 (i.e. activity in respect of cash outflows) and RG 21 (i.e. nil activity in respect of cash inflows).

Reporting Requirements

The ROC website provides a number of factsheets in relation to the financial reporting process and associated timelines. The website also contains the s.253 reporting guidelines and a model set of financial statements. The ROC recommends that reporting units use these model financial statements to assist in complying with the RO Act, the s.253 reporting guidelines and Australian Accounting Standards. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2019

The financial statements cover Shop, Distributive And Allied Employees' Association, Newcastle And Northern Branch as an individual entity. Shop, Distributive And Allied Employees' Association, Newcastle And Northem Branch is an association incorporated in New South Wales and operating pursuant to the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 and the requirements imposed by Part 3 of Chapter 8 of the Fair Work (Registered Organisations) Act 2009.

The financial statements were authorised for issue on 26 August 2019 by the members of the committee.

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Preparation

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Associations Incorporation Act 2009, the requirements imposed by Part 3 of Chapter 8 of the Fair Work (Registered Organisations) Act 2009 and Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations of the Australian Accounting Standards Board. The association is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities. The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars.

(a) income Tax

The Shop, Distributive and Allied Employees' Association, Newcastle and Northern Branch is an exempt body for income tax purposes.

(b) Fair Value of Assets and Liabilities

The association measures some of its assets and liabilities at fair value on either a recurring or non-recurring basis, depending on the requirements of the applicable Accounting Standard.

Fair value is the price the association would receive to sell an asset or would have to pay to transfer a liability in an orderly (ie unforced) transaction between independent, knowledgeable and willing market participants at the measurement date.

As fair value is a market-based measure, the closest equivalent observable market pricing information is used to determine fair value. Adjustments to market values may be made having regard to the characteristics of the specific asset or liability. The fair values of assets and liabilities that are not traded in an active market are determined using one or more valuation techniques. These valuation techniques maximise, to the extent possible, the use of observable market data.

To the extent possible, market information is extracted from either the principal market for the asset or liability (ie the market with the greatest volume and level of activity for the asset or liability) or, in the absence of such a market, the most advantageous market available to the entity at the end of the reporting period (ie the market that maximises the receipts from the sale of the asset or minimises the payments made to transfer the liability, after taking into account transaction costs and transport costs).

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2019

For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement also takes into account a market participant's ability to use the asset in its highest and best use or to sell it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use.

The fair value of liabilities and the entity's own equity instruments (excluding those related to share-based payment arrangements) may be valued, where there is no observable market price in relation to the transfer of such financial instruments, by reference to observable market information where such instruments are held as assets. Where this information is not available, other valuation techniques are adopted and, where significant, are detailed in the respective note to the financial statements.

(c) Financial Instruments

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the association commits itself to either purchase or sell the asset (i.e. trade date accounting is adopted).

Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value plus transactions costs, except where the instrument is classified 'at fair value through profit or loss' in which case transactions costs are recognised as expenses in profit or loss immediately. Where available, quoted prices in an active market are used to determine fair value. In other circumstances, valuation techniques are adopted.

Classification and subsequent measurement

Financial instruments are subsequently measured at fair value, amortised cost using the effective interest method or cost. Fair value represents the amount for which an asset could be exchanged or a liability settled, between knowledgeable, willing parties. Where available, quoted prices in an active market are used to determine fair value. In other circumstances, valuation techniques are adopted.

Amortised cost is calculated as the amount at which the financial asset or financial liability is measured at initial recognition less principal repayments and any reduction for impairment, and adjusted for any cumulative amortisation of the difference between that initial amount and the maturity amount calculated using the effective interest method.

Regular way purchases and sales of financial assets are recognised and derecognised at settlement date in accordance with the association's accounting policy.

(i) Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

The net gain or loss recognised in profit and loss includes any dividend or interest earned of the financial asset and is included in other gains and losses of the face of the statement of profit and loss and other comprehensive income.

(ii) Financial liabilities

Contingent consideration of an acquirer in a business combination to which AASB 3: Business Combinations applies is classified as a financial liability and measured at fair value through profit or loss.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2019

Impairment

At the end of each reporting period, the association assesses whether there is objective evidence that a financial asset has been impaired. A financial asset (or a group of financial assets) is deemed to be impaired if, and only if, there is objective evidence of impairment as a result of one or more events (a 'loss event') having occurred, which has an impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial asset(s).

Derecognition

Financial assets are derecognised when the contractual rights to receipt of cash flows expire or the asset is transferred to another party whereby the entity no longer has any significant continuing involvement in the risks and benefits associated with the asset. Financial liabilities are derecognised when the related obligations are discharged, cancelled or have expired. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability extinguished or transferred to another party and the fair value of consideration paid, including the transfer of non-cash assets or liabilities assumed, is recognised in profit or loss.

(d) Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting year are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

(e) Cash on Hand

Cash on hand includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(f) Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. Any consideration deferred is treated as the provision of finance and is discounted as a rate of interest that is generally accepted in the market for similar arrangements. The difference between the amount initially recognised and the amount ultimately received is interest revenue.

Membership revenue is recognised as and when it falls due.

Interest revenue is recognised as and when it is received.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

(g) Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting year for goods and services received by the association during the reporting year that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2019

(h) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST component of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

(i) Comparative Figures

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

(j) Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The committee evaluates estimates and judgements incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the association.

(k) New Accounting Standards for Application in Future Periods

The AASB has issued a number of new and amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have mandatory application dates for future reporting periods. The association has decided not to early adopt any of the new and amended pronouncements, as they do not consider any of these applicable to the entity.

Financial Risk Management Policies

The association's treasurer is responsible for, among other issues, monitoring and managing financial risk exposures of the association. The treasurer monitors the association's transactions and reviews the effectiveness of controls relating to credit risk, financial risk and interest rate risk. The committee of management discusses at their meetings the monitoring and management of the financial risk exposures.

The Treasurer's overall risk management strategy seeks to ensure that the association meets its financial targets, while minimising potential adverse effects of cash flow shortfalls.

Specific Financial Risk Exposures and Management

The main risks the association is exposed to through its financial instruments are credit risk, liquidity risk and market risk relating to interest rate risk and other price risk.

There have been no substantive changes in the types of risks the association is exposed to, how these risks arise, or the Committee's objectives, policies and processes for managing or measuring the risks from the previous period.

(a) Credit risk

Credit risk arises from the cash assets held.

The branch's holding of cash assets is only held by the Commonwealth Bank of Australia, therefore the cash assets are deemed to have limited credit risk.

Risk is also minimised through investing surplus funds in financial institutions that maintain a high credit rating or in entities that the finance committee has otherwise cleared as being financially sound.

Credit risk exposures
