OPERATING REPORT

This Operating Report covers the activities of the Liquor Hospitality and Miscellaneous Union, National Council, for the financial year ended 30th June 2005, the results of those activities and any significant changes in the nature of those activities during the year.

1. Principal Activities of the National Council

The principal activities of the National Council of the Union, as conducted through the National Office, during the past year fell into the following categories:

- Implementation of the decisions of the National Executive and National Council.
- Implementation of the union's organising agenda, including direct assistance and strategic advice on
 particular industry or site organising projects, the training and development of officials and assistance to
 branches on planning and resourcing campaigns.
- Coordination of campaigns undertaken by the union.
- Industrial support including representation of individual member grievances, advice on legal and legislative
 matters, pursuing relevant changes to the conditions of eligibility rules of the union, and responding to other
 unions' rules applications where they impact on membership of the LHMU.
- The administration of federal awards, the variation of awards following major test cases (such as living wage) and making applications to vary federal awards on behalf of branches.
- Management of information technology and strategic membership system designs to support organising.
- National media and communications to members and to the broader community via media releases in support of campaigns, video and film development, and targeted publications, including the national magazine Union News.
- National bargaining in key national industries, and assistance to branches on bargaining by request.

The National Office has consulted with the ACTU on the development of claims, including 2005 living wage case. Where appropriate, the National Office has assisted branches in the implementation of relevant decisions via the variation of awards.

The National office has also been involved in lobbying and negotiations with different levels of Government and key industry organisations around issues of importance to LHMU members, eg smoke free workplaces in hospitality and child care skill shortages issues.

2. The National Council's Financial Affairs

Significant changes in the National Office financial affairs include a rise in income from sustentation fees. This has arisen from an increase in membership dues and growth in membership in some branches. The National Office also received a one off benefit from the sale of 3 houses in the Northern Territory.

During the 2004-5 financial year, the National Office funded branches to implement mutually agreed growth projects and activities via the National Organising Fund. Funds were also allocated to ACTU campaigns against the Federal Government's proposed anti-union legislation.

3. Right of Members to Resign.

All Members of the Union have the right to resign from the Union in accordance with Rule 10 of the Union Rules, (and Section 174 of the Workplace Relations Act); namely, by providing written notice addressed and delivered to the Secretary of the relevant Branch, including via email.

4. Superannuation Trustees.

Tim Ferrari is an officer of the National Office and is a Trustee and Member of the Board of Directors of the HOSTPLUS Superannuation Fund.

Jo-anne Schofield was an officer of the National Office and was a Trustee and Member of the Board of Directors of the Australian Retirement Fund. During the year, she resigned from this board consequent on her resignation from the union. Mark Boyd, Assistant Secretary, of the New South Wales Branch has replaced her on this board.

5. Membership of the Union

There were 135,654 members of the union as at 30th June 2005.

6. Employees of the National Council

As at 30th June 2005 the National Council employed 16 full time employees and 8 part time employees with a total number of 21.9 employees on a fulltime equivalent basis.

NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2005

1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial report has been prepared and presented in accordance with applicable Accounting Standards, other mandatory professional requirements and the Workplace Relations Act, 1996. The financial report has also been prepared on the basis of historical costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where stated, current valuations of non-current assets. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

The following is a summary of the significant policies adopted by the Union in the preparation of the accounts.

- (a) Depreciation of fixed assets is calculated on the straight line basis in order to write the assets off over their useful lives to the Union.
- (b) Provision for employee benefits in the form of Long Service Leave and Accrued Annual Leave have been made for the estimated entitlements of all employees on the basis of their terms of employment.

The provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

In the case of Long Service Leave, the provision has been measured by reference to periods of service and current salary rates as it is considered that this results in an amount not materially different to that achieved by discounting estimated future cash flows.

Contributions are made by the Union to employee superannuation funds and are charged as expenses when incurred.

- (c) No provision for Income Tax is necessary as the Union is exempt from Income Tax under Section 50–15 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.
- d) Australian Equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (AIFRSs)

National Council is preparing and managing transition to Australian equivalents to international financial reporting standards (AIFRS) effective for financial reporting periods commencing from 1 January 2005. The adoption of AIFRS will be reflected in the Council's financial statements for the year ending 30 June 2006. On first time adoption of AIFRS, comparatives for the financial year ended 30 June 2005 are required to be restated. The majority of the AIFRS transitional adjustments will be made retrospectively against retained earnings at 1 July 2004. The National Council is of the opinion that there are no material differences in the Council's accounting policies on conversion to AIFRS except as follows:

National Council currently assesses the amount of impairment of assets by determining the recoverable amount on the basis of undiscounted cash flows. Under Australian equivalents to IFRSs, AASB 116 Impairment of Assets, the Council will be required to determine the recoverable amount as the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use (which is depreciated replacement cost). The Council has considered all assets for impairment and no assets were found to be impaired therefore there is no impact on financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2005.

Users of the financial statements should, however, note that the amounts disclosed could change if there are any amendments to the current AIFRS by standard-setters, or interpretation of the AIFRS requirements changes due to continuing transition work of the National Council.

2. INFORMATION TO BE PROVIDED TO MEMBERS OR REGISTRAR

In accordance with the requirements of the Workplace Relations Act, 1996, the attention of members is drawn to the provisions of Sub-Sections [1], [2] and [3] of Section 272 of Schedule 1B which read as follows:-

- [1] A member of a reporting unit, or a Registrar, may apply to the reporting unit for specified prescribed information in relation to the reporting unit to be made available to the person making the application.
- [2] The application must be in writing and must specify the period within which, and the manner in which, the information is to be made available. The period must not be less than 14 days after the application is given to the reporting unit.
- [3] A reporting unit must comply with an application made under subsection (1).
